<p><b>MTSS</b> Students will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Be familiar with school expectations and use common vocabulary to assess and regulate their own behavior.</li> <li>● Families will be more confident and will experience more success teaching their children</li> <li>● Families will be clear about weekly contact and monthly reporting requirements</li> <li>● Families will be clear about curriculum pacing</li> <li>● Families will be able to access resources for their struggling learners</li> <li>●</li> </ul>	<p><b>MTSS</b> Teachers will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Develop common school expectations.</li> <li>● Hallway, classroom, outside, end-of-day procedures, lunch, etc.</li> <li>● Teach and reinforce school expectations.</li> <li>● Continue to use monthly Character Strong themes: teach in onsite classes, introduce and reinforce in monthly newsletter for families.</li> <li>● Offer parent classes/workshops <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Teaching strategies</li> <li>○ Motivating your child</li> <li>○ Tips for homeschool success</li> <li>○ Different types of learners</li> <li>○ Ways to be flexible with a curriculum and still use it</li> </ul> </li> <li>● Hold introductory class for all new families (do already?)</li> <li>● Create a document with clear expectations (done)</li> <li>● Improve the weekly reporting form to add subject titles on the left and sample wording at the top of boxes on the right</li> <li>● Require an in-person family meeting every other month</li> <li>● Create a report folder for each family that includes the signed expectation document, pacing guides, sample weekly reporting form, and sample monthly progress</li> <li>● Improve existing pacing guides and create pacing guides for a curriculum where pacing guides don't exist (in the process)</li> <li>● Make sure all families are provided with pacing guides for all of their curricula (in a report folder?)</li> <li>● Create FOCUS standards for parents for K-8? or at least K-5 (in the process)</li> </ul>
